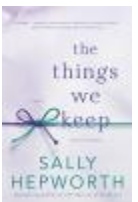

In the 17th- and 18th-century, pioneers set out to start new lives in the Northwest Territory. (nonfiction, 2019)

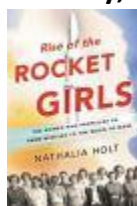

Female mathematicians employed by the Jet Propulsion Laboratory during World War II continued their work during peace time. (nonfiction, 2016)

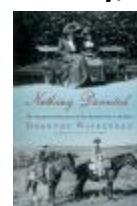
